David Katz is an adjunct associate professor with Duke University's Nicholas School of the Environment and is a senior lecturer in the school of environmental sciences with the University of Haifa, Israel. He specializes in environmental and resource policy and economics, with an emphasis on water resource management. His recent research has covered the relationship between economic growth and resource consumption; policy and politics of transboundary waters; incentives for natural resource conservation; environmental conflict and peacebuilding; and the economic valuation of natural resources. In addition, he has conducted research on issues such as international trade and the environment, renewable energy policy, green building, and transportation policy. David has worked on research and consulted for numerous international, governmental, intergovernmental, and non-governmental organizations and agencies, including various UN agencies, the World Bank, and others. Among these, he led research for the regional environmental NGO Ecopeace Middle East which served as the basis for an international agreement between Israel and Jordan to exchange desalinated water and solar energy. David received a B.A. in philosophy and political science from the University of Illinois, an M.A. in international studies from the University of Washington, and an M.A. in applied economics and a Ph.D. in natural resource policy from the University of Michigan.
